

# HOW TO AVOID HARMING Sea Turtles While Boating

The Texas Coast is home to 5 different species of sea turtles. Some sea turtles live offshore, while others live in the bays year-round or for short periods of time. Sea turtles have lungs and must swim to the surface to breathe air. Sea turtles can be hit by boats and their propellers as they swim at the surface of the water.

It is illegal to deliberately harm, harass, capture or kill sea turtles because they are protected by federal and state laws, but if you accidentally collide with or hook a sea turtle while fishing, DON'T PANIC! You will not get in trouble. See the other side of this flyer for recommendations if you accidentally collide with or hook a sea turtle.





## **PRACTICES TO PREVENT COLLISIONS**

- Wear polarized sunglasses to reduce glare so you can see turtles in the water.
- Have a designated wildlife spotter to look for sea turtles and other animals.
- Stay in deep water whenever possible.
- Avoid boating over seagrass beds and shallow waters.



- Follow all slow speed and no-wake zones.
- **Give sea turtles space** by keeping your boat at least 50 yards (~150 feet) away.
- **Do not follow,** pursue, or entrap sea turtles.

# IF YOU FIND YOURSELF LESS THAN 50 YARDS FROM A SEA TURTLE

- **Use no-wake speed** and put the engine in neutral
- Move away slowly and DO NOT expect sea turtles to swim out of the way!
- Ensure the turtle is safely away from your boat before engaging the propellor

Gently reel in the slackline, keeping the turtle above water to breathe. DO NOT tug or pull on the line; minimize injury by applying steady pressure on the line

**Cut the line** as close to the turtle as possible to release it

- Inspect your gear before you begin fishing to reduce line breaks while fishing.
- Use barbless hooks to reduce injury to sea turtles.
- Use non-stainless steel hooks that will eventually corrode.
- Use artificial bait which is less attractive to sea turtles.
- Never leave fishing gear unattended for any length of time, and check your bait often.
- Don't discard bait or fish scraps in the water because this will attract sea turtles.

- Never intentionally feed sea turtles.
- Put used fishing line in a recycling bin.
- Put all other trash in trash cans.
- Report sea turtle sightings using the iSeaTurtle app for Android or iPhone.
